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What is a 4-H?

It is an opportunity for young people to learn leadership, citizenship and life skills as they work in partnership with caring adults. 4-H is committed to helping young people develop skills that will help them succeed. 4-H will empower youth to reach their full potential.

4-H is learn by doing projects of each youth's choice. 4-H gives opportunities to learn life skills, to practice the skills, and become confident in their ability to use them in the future. 4-H teaches young people how to meet their needs for belonging, mastery, independence, and generosity in positive ways.

4-H is based on research. 4-H members have the opportunity to become better citizens, leaders and communicators for the future.

4-H is not just going to the fair. By completing a 4-H project, members then have the privilege of being eligible to participate in the fair and receive a fair pass. 4-H projects must be complete to compete at State Fair even if members choose not to participate in Champaign County Fair. To complete a project, members must:

- Attend 8 4-H Club Meetings per year as set by their 4-H Club.
- Complete a project book or other packet as required per project.
- Animal project members must complete Quality Assurance Training each year or test out.
- Complete skill-a-thon or judging, whichever is required for their project.

Record Keeping

Keeping records is an important part of livestock projects. There are several different types of records to keep for your animal projects. Each type of record serves a different purpose, but all are important for the overall management of healthy animals.

Financial records and budgeting is the most common type of record keeping. Financial records help you determine if you are making money with your project. Market animal and breeding animal projects both should both have financial records showing value of the animals, expenses put into the animal and the sale or value of the animal at the end of the project. Expenses would include feed, equipment used for animals, medications, bedding, etc. 4-H members are fortunate that they receive market value and a premium amount for the projects they sell at the fair. It is important for members to realize that if they were raising animals for a living, they would not receive the extra premium amount so it's important to understand real cost as part of project learning.

Medication records should be kept on every animal. It is important to know withdrawal times on market animals and preventative medicine records for market and breeding animals.

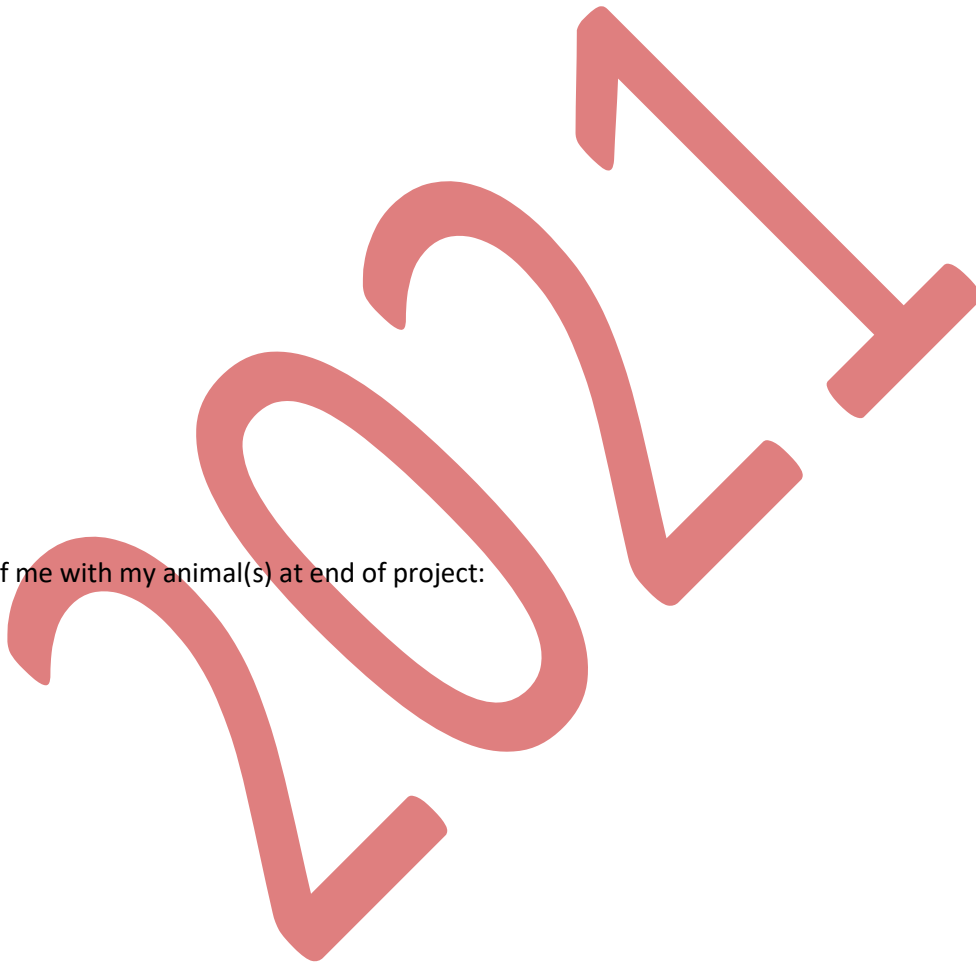
Pedigree and birthing records are important to maintain the best producing breeding stock and to manage proper breeding and herd health.

Growth records are important to keep on market animals. This allows the producer to evaluate the efficiency in feeds they are using and gives information for future breeding.

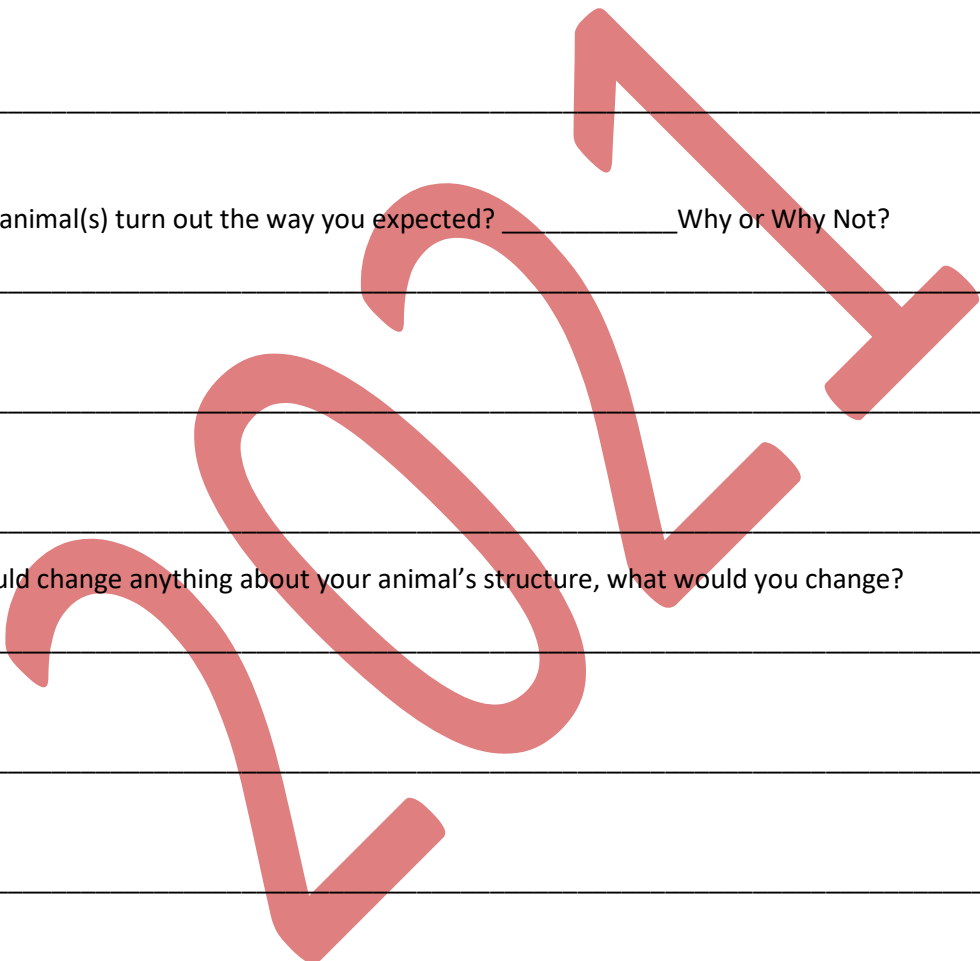

- ✿ Develop a plan to deal with questions from the public or media.


